1.0 SUMMARY

From March to September 2011, Swale and Thames Archaeological Survey Company (SWAT Archaeology) carried out an Archaeological Watching Brief on the site of Gads Hill School during the ground works associated with a new-build school and associated car parking in the grounds of Gads Hill, formally owned by Charles Dickens. The works were carried out on behalf of The Fulker Consultancy Ltd. Planning Application Number: GR/07/1088).

The Watching Brief revealed no archaeological features.

2.0 INTRODUCTION

2.1 Planning Background

A planning application (PAN:GR/07/1088) for the construction of a new school and associated car parking, soft and hard landscaping was submitted to Medway Council. Kent County Council Heritage and Conservation (KCCHC), on behalf of Medway Council requested that an Archaeological Watching Brief be undertaken in order to record any archaeological remains uncovered during associated groundworks. The following condition was attached to the planning consent:

No development shall take place until the applicant, or their agents or successors in title, has secured the implementation of a watching brief to be undertaken by an archaeologist approved by the Local Planning Authority so that the excavation is observed and items of interest and finds are recorded. The watching brief shall be in accordance with a written programme and specification, which has been submitted to and approved by the Local Planning Authority.

2.2 Schedule of Visits

An experienced archaeologist attended the site and monitored excavation works from March to September during Phase 1A- construction of car park and Phase 1B ground works associated with the build of the school. In addition a watch was kept on garden improvements and meter box and cable runs.

2.3 Aims and Objectives

The purpose of the monitoring and recording, as specified by Kent County Council was to:

'contribute to the heritage knowledge of the area through the recording of any archaeological remains exposed as a result of excavations in connection with the groundworks'. (KCC 2010:3.1)

2.4 Proposed Groundworks

The ground works involved area strip of topsoil both of the car park and junior school areas (Figure 2). Subsequently strip foundations for the junior school build were watched plus drain and service runs (Plate 1). No archaeology was revealed.

2.5 Confidence Rating

No factors hindered the recognition of archaeological and geological deposits during the monitoring and recording exercise.

3.0 ARCHAEOLOGICAL & GEOLOGICAL BACKGROUND

The underlying geology at the site according to the British Geological Survey map is of Upper Chalk with flints and covered by Thanet Beds of Sand (see Plate 1).

Topographically the site slopes down to the south-east. The west boundary along Crutches Lane is at 76.50aOD whilst the east boundary of the site slopes down to the school playing fields at 74.50aOD.

The archaeological potential is based on the proximity of archaeological remains recorded in the KCC HER. These include:

Worked flints found in the immediate area which may suggest a possible flint-working site (HER TQ 77 SW 16)

There a number of cropmarks in the surrounding area which have been interpreted as prehistoric features:

A possible Bronze Age ring ditch (HER TQ 77 SW 25)

A possible Bronze Age single-circuit ring ditch (HER TQ 77 Sw 28)

Two probable Bronze Age ring ditches seen as cropmarks (HER TQ 77 SE 31)

Romano-British cremations were discovered close to the development site at Peartree Lane, Shorne at NGR TQ 6987 7051 (HER TQ 67 SE 21)

Charles Dickens resided at Gads Hill from 1856 to 1870 and improved and extended the property. Much time was spent on improving the gardens with "orchard, croquet

lawn, flowerbeds, steps, gravel paths, tennis courts, and terracing", all of which may have survived in the archaeological record.

4.0 METHODOLOGY

The Watching Brief was conducted in accordance with the specification compiled by Kent County Council Heritage and Conservation and it also complied with the Institute of Field Archaeologists' *Standards and Guidance for Archaeological Watching Briefs* (1999). The works comprised the observation of all groundworks, including the inspection of subsoil and natural deposits for archaeological features and finds.

5.0 RESULTS

5.1 General

Reduction of the surface in Phase 1A to construct a car park and again the groundworks in Phase 1B revealed an extensive area of natural geology (Plates 1, 2). No archaeological features were recorded.

6.0 FINDS

No archaeological features were found and no finds were retrieved.

7.0 DISCUSSION

The Archaeological Watching Brief carried out at Gads Hill School revealed that no archaeological features were present.

8.0 CONCLUSION

The Archaeological Watching Brief has fulfilled the primary aims and objectives of the Specification. No buried archaeological features have been affected as a result of the development.

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


Figure 1. Site Location at TQ 7102 7084
